# **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

A study of spiritual formation and the role of discipleship in the believer's transformation toward Christ-likeness. Attention is given to the disciplines of spiritual living and the process of discipleship.

# **Online Discussion Forums**

Learning in this course relies on developing shared understanding through social learning and dialogue. Join the ongoing course conversation by initially posting to each week's discussion forum based on the criteria outlined in the forum descriptions. Posts should be concise and conversational, stating what you think, why you think that, and what more you would like to know or understand.

Be intentional to support your claims in each post with at least two of the following, all three if possible: personal experience, course content, or credible external research. Engage your peers by replying in their discussion threads with questions, suggestions or examples that extend or challenge their ideas and stimulate further conversation.

Initial participation in each forum is due by 11:59 p.m. CT on Thursday and follow-up participation in the discussion is due Sunday. More frequent participation is recommended since others depend on your contributions.

Full grading expectations are noted in the online discussion forum rubric on the course site.

# **Spiritual Inventory Response**

Week 1 - students are to complete the spiritual inventory found in the Spiritual Inventory Guide. By week 3, students are to reflect on their responses to the spiritual inventory and follow up with these steps:

- 1. Read through all of the Spiritual Inventory Guide.
- 2. Choose one of the five areas that the inventory suggests there is a need for growth. Then write a brief description how you are going to create an environment for growth in that area and how you are going to facilitate growth in that area.

# **Personal Evangelistic Testimony Paper**

Write a 3-minute personal evangelistic testimony. You will record it with VoiceThread and share it Week 3. The testimony must fit the following requirements:

- 1. Clear expression of your ideas within three minutes
- 2. Scriptural support when appropriate
- 3. Absence of religious jargon or unexplained figures of speech

4. Ideas aimed at non-Christians so they can know how to become a Christian as a result of listening to your presentation

# Macchia Papers

For Weeks 2 and 4, write a 2- to 3-page paper answering the questions posted in the Macchia Text Reflection Paper submission point for that week's Macchia reading assignment.

# **Reflective Journal**

The reflective journal is a good opportunity for you to draw your thoughts together from all of the sources of input in the course. By recording your thoughts, feelings and questions, you can benefit from meditating on the material that comes and goes very quickly during a four-week course.

The reflective journal should blend three emphases:

- Your responses to the course materials, discussions, and assignments
- Your life experience relevant to the course objectives
- Your ministry goals and desires for the future

The journal should record your thinking from several class activities:

- Questions to be answered at this time are: Any assignments that are not to be turned in. Incorporate those assignments into your journal.
  - What have I learned today?
  - How might this material stretch me into new areas of learning? 0
  - How do my life and ministry experiences relate to what we have studied today? Do they clash? Challenge? Confirm my experiences?
- Any other reading or experiences you may wish to include in your written record.

Journals are graded on the basis of your demonstration that you have adequately interacted with the course materials. The journal format must include the day's date and entries written legibly. They need not be in any specific format, only one that is helpful to you. Journals are submitted as weekly documents online.

# **Applied Summary Paper**

Develop a personal strategy for growth based on the material studied in the course: the gospel, discipleship, spiritual living, Christian character, etc. The strategy should include the following features:

- 1. Your personal goals for Christian living. In 10 years, what do you hope to be true about yourself spiritually and your relationship to God?
- 2. Your personal plan to achieve the goals described in Question 1. How will you accomplish your goals? What role will the following resources play: personal disciplines, other Christians, life circumstances?
- 3. Obstacles that you anticipate might slow or hinder the attainment of your goals.

The paper should be about 4–6 pages. Superior papers integrate course resources (readings, exercises, class discussion, etc.) into your thoughts. The essay must be written up to the standards of the University of Northwestern English department.

# **Format**

This course is delivered in an online format that provides all learning activities online. The day the course starts is considered Day 1 of Week 1 for the course. For example, if a course begins on a Monday, then Day 1 is Monday, Day 4 is Thursday, and Day 7 is the following Sunday.
